The Bicentennial Organ, Opus 65 Taylor and Boody Organbuilders Staunton, Virginia **Delbert Disselhorst** was a member of the University of Iowa faculty from 1970 to 2008. He holds both the Bachelor of Music degree and Master of Music degree in organ from the University of Illinois. As a recipient of a Fulbright grant, he studied at the Hochschule für Musik in Frankfurt am Main, Germany, where he was a student of Helmut Walcha. He earned the Doctor of Musical Arts degree from the University of Michigan where he was awarded the Palmer Christian citation as a distinguished graduate of the organ department. His teachers include Jerald Hamilton, Mildred Andrews Boggess, Marilyn Mason and Russell Saunders. He also coached with Catharine Crozier and Michael Radulescu.

As a concert artist, Disselhorst has performed in the United States, Canada, Europe and Korea. He has been a featured recitalist for regional conventions and a national convention of the American Guild of Organists. His recordings include works by Rorem and Pinkham for the Arkay label and the *Harmonische Seelenlust* of G.F.Kauffmann for Pro Organo Records. He has most recently completed for Naxos records two volumes of chorale preludes by Helmut Walcha. These were released in 2013.

For the 2011-2012 academic year he was visiting Professor of Organ at the University of Notre Dame.

David Craighead and Russell Saunders

Colleagues, great teachers, mentors and friends to all

When I was 14 years old, Florida State University installed a new organ in their concert hall. For the inaugural concert season two great organists came to town. This was my first exposure to David Craighead and Russell Saunders. Within a few years I was studying with Michael Corzine, who had studied with Professor Saunders at the Eastman School of Music and a path began that led me to Rochester in 1986 where I had the opportunity to be mentored by both of these great men.

Their musicianship and discipline were exemplary, but even more was the quality of their humanity and joy of life along with their ability to develop and foster these traits in their students. One colleague remarked that not 15 minutes goes by that something from one of them enters into a life experience and becomes part of the music being offered or the lesson taught.

Since their passing it has been my dream to offer a musical afternoon in their memory. Today we celebrate the gifts they offered so freely to all, gifts that helped define and craft this new organ. Dr. Disselhorst was a frequent visitor to the organ department at Eastman during my time there. As this organ was being completed and he came by to have a listen it dawned on me that he would be the perfect artist to fulfill today's goal. It is a great honor to welcome him to Grace Church for this special afternoon of music on the Bicentennial Organ.

Patrick Allen

David Craighead (1924 – 2012) was born in Strasburg, Pennsylvania. He studied with Alexander McCurdy at the Curtis Institute of Music in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, receiving a Bachelor of Music degree in 1946. While at Curtis he met his future wife Marian Reiff, also a pupil of McCurdy. They married in 1948. From 1955 until his retirement in the summer of 1992 he was both Professor of Organ and Chair of the Organ Division of the Keyboard Department at the Eastman School of Music in Rochester, New York. Craighead was organist of St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Rochester, a position he held for 48 years. Craighead was the first recipient of Eastman's Eisenhart Award for Teaching Excellence. The New York City chapter of the American Guild of Organists named him International Performer of the Year in 1983.

Russell Saunders (1921-1992) was professor of organ at Eastman from 1967 until he passed away unexpectedly in 1992. Before coming to Eastman, he earned his bachelor's and master's degrees from Drake University and served in the armed forces during World War II. During his quarter century at Eastman, Saunders established a reputation as an exceptional teacher who, along with his colleague David Craighead, set the standard for collegiate organ teaching in America. In 1986 he was awarded the Eisenhart Award for Excellence in Teaching and the University Mentor Award recognizing scholarly pursuits and work with junior faculty. He was highly regarded for his excellent teaching techniques, warm personal style, and vitality.
